HOW DO I BECOME AN EXHIBITOR? EASY!

"I Can Make That" says everyone.

- 1. Look through the Exhibitors' Guide and determine if you have items that you have created, grown, baked, etc. within this past year. *Read livestock rules for
- 2. ALL building exhibitors must register all items online at www.othellofair.org before deadline dates (August 30th by 5pm).
- 3. Bring your entries to the fairgrounds Tuesday, September 10th from 12:00pm - 7:00pm.
- 4. Exhibitor (Livestock only) packets may be picked up at the back entrance gate. The packet will include ayour wristband (which is required for personal property while on the fairgrounds or in the exhibitor to get into the fair), a receipt for all fees paid to the fair, and for livestockexhibitors, your show ring number.
- 5. Car passes and additional weekly passes will be included in your campground packet if you purchased those in advance.
- 6. Our fair family will direct you to the Exhibitor's Building where, with the help of a Department Superintendent, you will fill out an entry tag.

- 7. Leave your item to be judged and enjoyed.
- 8. You can view your items and all exhibits throughout the fair.
- 9. All items, ribbons, and special prizes can be picked up at the conclusion of the fair Sunday, September 15th by 12:00pm.
- 10. Most important Have Fun! Be Safe!

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

ENTRIES

- Only residents of Adams, Franklin, Grant, Lincoln, and Whitman counties may exhibit at the Othello Fair. The exception is for exhibitors with breeding stock, which is open to all Washington State residents.
- 2. All Exhibitors must register all items online by due dates listed.
- No exhibits may be entered in more than one class. Special exhibit limits may apply in some departments.
- 4. All exhibits will be entered between 12:00pm and 7:00pm on Tuesday of fair week.
- Exhibitors must register and be assigned an exhibitor's number prior to arriving at the fairgrounds. One exhibitor number should be used for all exhibits entered by an individual in still life and/or livestock.
- NO EXHIBITS OR LIVESTOCK ARE TO BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY BETWEEN <u>8:00AM</u> <u>AND NOON</u> INCLUDING TACK OR DECORATIONS, or EXHIBITORS MAY FORFEIT PREMIUM POINTS.
- The Othello Fair Board reserves the right to remove ANY individual or group who's conduct or actions are not in the best interest of all fair goers and exhibitors.

JUDGING

- 1. All livestock division premiums will be judged on the Danish system except in the Open Adult Class of Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep, and Horses. JUDGES DECISIONS ARE FINAL.
- 2. The best entry from each Section may be awarded Best of Class, The Best of Show is selected from the Best of Class Winner.
- 3. No additional premium points are given for special ribbons.
- 4. For an exhibit to qualify for a champion ribbon it must first receive a blue ribbon in its class.
- 5. Any person violating any rules will forfeit any/all premiums.
- All premium checks will be mailed to the exhibitors at the end of fair to the address used during registration. Checks will be mailed as soon as all information is verified. (approx. 4-8 weeks)
- 7. They will have a void date on them.

HOURS

- Fairgrounds will open at 8:00am daily and close at 10:00pm on Wednesday and Thursday, 11:00pm on Friday and Midnight on Saturday.
- Livestock gates will open at 6:00am for livestock exhibitors.

GARBAGE

- 1. Garbage removal and replenish supplies for concession stands and commercial booths will be completed before 9:00am.
- 2. *EVERYONE* is responsible to help keep their area around them free of garbage.

PARKING

- No vehicles will be allowed on the fairgrounds after 9:00am or before 10:00pm.
- 2. All vehicles will be removed immediately following unloading of animals and equipment between 2:00pm and 8:00pm on Tuesday of Fair week.
- Trucks and cars will be parked only in designated areas. This rule is strictly enforced for the protection and safety of exhibitors, their exhibits, spectators at the fair and to allow for emergency vehicle.
- 4. No bicycles or skateboards are allowed on the fairgrounds.

UNLOADING OF LIVESTOCK

UNLOADING OF LIVESTOCK IS TO BE JUST THAT. PLEASE UNLOAD YOUR ANIMAL(S) ONLY AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE. THEN FIND A PLACE IN THE DESIGNATED PARKING TO UNLOAD THE REST OF YOUR EQUIPMENT AND PERSONAL ITEMS TO TAKE TO YOUR PEN/STALL/CAGE AREA.

ADVERTISING

- 1. No person will be permitted to distribute advertising material on the grounds, except from their place of business or exhibit space. The taking or posting of any advertisement. bills, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibits is strictly prohibited. Anyone violating this rule is liable for a fine or expulsion from the fair. Begging, soliciting, performing, petition signing or public speaking are prohibited. The parking lot is included in these advertising restrictions.
- 2. No "For Sale" or other commercial signs are allowed on any exhibit that is entered for competition.

PETS

- 1. PETS are *only* allowed in the campground area during the fair, except for service animals and Law Enforcement K9's.
- 2. All pets must be kept on a leash at all times within the campground. They are not allowed on the fairgrounds at any time. Only service animals are allowed on the fairgrounds. All owner(s) are responsible for cleanup and proper disposal of waste.
- 3. If any pet is causing a disturbance, the owner will be asked to remove the animal or to leave the grounds.



*NO SMOKING OR VAPING IS ALLLOWED IN ANY FAIR BUILDING AT ANY TIME. ALCOHOL LICK STRIPS MAY BE USED ON MINORS SUSPECTED OF DRINKING OR UNDER THE INFLUENCE ON FAIRGROUNDS AND WOULD BE SUBJECT TO EVICTION AND/OR TURNED OVER TO THE ATHORITIES.

ENTRY TIMES, RULES, AND REGULATIONS

*Superintendent's reserve the right to interpret rules and misprints and settle controversies regarding the premium book. The process to be used is superintendent takes such interpretations to the Fair Board or Livestock department. Department specific rules precede general rules.

- 1. No Exhibits may be entered in more than one class. Special exhibit limits may apply in some departments.
- 2. For an exhibit to qualify for a champion ribbon, it must first receive a blue ribbon in its class.
- **3.** All division premiums will be judged on the Danish System, except in open Adult Class of Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep, Horses, Rabbits, and Poultry.
- 4. Any person knowingly violating any rules will forfeit any/all premiums.
- 5. The Othello Fair Board reserves the right to remove ANY individual or group who's conduct or actions are not in the best interest of all fair goers and exhibitors. No Exhibits may be entered in more than one class. Special exhibit limits may apply in some departments.

Section A Community Agricultural Booths

Any Grange or community group is eligible to exhibit a booth at the fair. Space must be pre-arranged with the department superintendent. The name of group must appear on the booth.

Section B Commercial Booths

Any group or organization is eligible to have a commercial booth at the fair. Space must be pre-arranged with the department superintendent. Name of organization must appear on the booth.

BOOTHS, COMMERCIAL ENTRIES AND CONCESSIONS

- 1. Must be arranged in advance with the Othello Fair Board Vendor Superintendents. For more information go to the department section.
- 2. Booth rentals *must be* paid in advance. All materials for decorating must be fire resistant.
- **3.** Commercial exhibitors must prepare and decorate their own booth space and keep that area neat, clean and safe at all times.
- 4. Commercial building will be open to the public at 8:00am and close at 10:00 pm.
- 5. Garbage removal and resupplying must be done before 8:00am.

Rules & Policies

- 1. One belt buckle will be awarded in the Fitting & Showing Contest for the Grand Champion in each division (i.e. Youth Senior, Youth Intermediate, Youth Junior, FFAI, FFAII, etc. in each livestock department) except in the Open Youth Division, there will be a ribbon only.
- A minimum of three participants in each department division (i.e. Youth Senior, Youth Intermediate, Youth Junior, FFA I & FFA II) will be required before Grand Champion Buckle is awarded or may be awarded depending upon the judge's discretion.
- All other places in Fitting & Showing will receive a ribbon or buckle.
- 4. Grand Champion & Reserve Champion ribbons will be given in each department and age group.

- 5. Grand Champion awards will be presented at the awards presentation.
- 6. All Youth and FFA members must fit and show their own animal in each livestock department in which they have an animal entered. Failure to fit and show or be officially excused by that livestock superintendent will result in loss of all premiums in that department.
- 7. Animals must be owned by the established ownership dates.
- Horned heifers may be shown in Fitting & Showing classes ONLY if their horns are weighted. No horned dairy heifers in Fitting & Showing and the Round Robin Livestock Show.

SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

(Please sign and return with entry form)

- I believe that my participation in the Othello Fair should demonstrate my own ability, knowledge and skill as an exhibitor of livestock/animal(s).
- I believe as an exhibitor I will conduct myself with ethics and not do anything to disrupt another's display or exhibit.
- I will do my own work to the full extent of my capabilities and otherwise will only accept advice and support from others.
- I realize that I am responsible for:
 - The proper care and safe, humane treatment of my animal(s).
 - The production of high quality, safe and wholesome food.
 - Demonstrating strong moral character as an example of others.
- I will not use or allow the use of abusive, fraudulent or illegal practices in the feeding, fitting and showing of my animal(s).
- I consent to having my animal(s) subjected to drug/substance testing if asked.
- I have kept complete and accurate records of all feeds, medications and treatments given to my animal(s).
- I will read and will follow the rules without exception of the Othello Fair in which I am a participant and ask that my parents and the supervisor of my project do the same.
- My livestock/animal project will be reflection of the life cycle of my animal depicting the challenges, the rewards, or the outcome, and the lessons learned throughout the process.
- I will not criticize or interfere with the judge, other exhibitors or fair officials before, during or after fair events.
- I have read, understand, support and will abide by the above Code of Ethics.

CAMPGROUND RULES AND REGULATIONS

Campground Coordinator: Becky Flint 509-760-1997

- Othello Fair does not guarantee water or electric hookups. Spaces are limited to availability. Receipt of money does not guarantee a space.
- Curfew for all people staying on the grounds is midnight. Violators will be subject to expulsion from the grounds and forfeiture of premiums. Camp space fee will not be refunded.
- 3. Camping permits with name of owner must be displayed for easy identification.
- 4. One small tent will be allowed if they can fit with your other accommodations. Otherwise, two spaces must be reserved.
- Camping vehicles must utilize the assigned marked off space for the duration of the fair. All transportation vehicles must be detached from trailers and parked outside of the camp area in the parking area ONLY.
- Any camper/trailer without qualified adult supervision will be expelled from the grounds. List names of all campers on the Campground Registration Form.
- Livestock trucks and horse trailers shall be parked in the south parking lot (south of the horse barns) next to the back gate. NO EXCEPTIONS! Do not park east of the pig barns or vehicle will be towed at owner's expense.
- A vehicle parking pass is required for the backgate parking lot. This pass does NOT allow parking at the campground or other undesignated areas.
- 9. No illegal or abusive drugs will be allowed on the grounds at any time. Alcohol Lick Strips may be used on minors suspected of drinking on the fairgrounds or being on the property under the influence and would be subject to eviction and/or turned over to the authorities.
- 10. Anyone not abiding by the Campground Rules and Regulations will be expelled from the fair with forfeiture of all premium monies, sale monies and without refund of parking pass or camp space.



LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Exhibitors will be required to read and sign the Show Ring Code of Ethics. Exhibitors whose actions and conduct are abusive or threatening to other persons will be asked to remove their exhibit and leave the fairgrounds. Any premiums and awards will be forfeited. An exhibitor and their animal(s) may be dismissed by the judge from any class if the exhibitor mistreats the animal(s). Fair management may dismiss an exhibitor and their animal(s) from participation at the entire show if the exhibitor mistreats their animal(s).
- 2. Health records will be required for all Youth and FFA large livestock entries.
- All Youth and FFA livestock exhibitors will be required to provide a current Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Certification by July 15.
- Animals observed without food and/or water for extended periods of time will result in exhibitors forfeiting all premium points, sales monies and may be removed from participating upon investigation by the ethics committee.
- All livestock and horses must be pre-registered for the fair. Entries are open July 15th – August 31st online at www.othellofair.org. Read General Rules and Regulations. Youth and FFA, exhibitors will also pre-register their animal in the appropriate age category of the Livestock Fitting and Showing contest online entry.
- All market stock entries must be weighed off the truck on Tuesday from 2:00pm-8:00pm. A separate brand inspection slip for each steer must be submitted to the beef superintendent upon arrival.

- All livestock exhibitors are expected to attend the General Meeting of Exhibitors at the sale barn at 8:30am on Wednesday. At this time, announcements will be made, and questions answered.
- 8. Shavings will be provided for bedding in all departments. No straw allowed.
- Required dates of ownership: February 1st, Dairy Springer Heifers; May 1st, Market Steers; April 1st, Horses; May 1st, Dairy & Breeding Beef; June 15th, Sheep & Swine; Goats must be born after January 1st, ownership by June 15th; Rabbits and Poultry must be born after January 1st. ownership 45 days prior to fair.
- 10. All cattle must be halter trained and the exhibitor must be able to handle the animal. All cattle must always be tied with a satisfactory neck rope in addition to a halter and rope in the barn until close of fair on Sunday.
- **11.** The Othello Fair Board reserves the right to reject or remove any unruly animal at any time.
- 12. All Youth and FFA EXHIBITORS must do their own fitting, clipping, cleanup, etc., and must enter a Fitting and Showing Contest in each department unless excused by the superintendent or you will forfeit your place in the sale. Parents and other adults are required to refrain from preparing livestock while at the show.
- 13. Exhibitors must own, take care of, and exhibit their own animals unless excused by the superintendent for reasons that are deemed sufficient.
- **14.** Horses and riders are not allowed in any area other than the horse arenas, stalls, and.

horse show ring. All horses must be led, except in designated areas. Violators will forfeit all premiums and awards.

- 15. The superintendents of the Livestock Judging Contest are responsible for the setting up of this contest and arranging for these animals to be in the show ring on time. An exhibitor must prepare their animal(s) for use in the Livestock Judging Contest upon request of the superintendent or forfeit their premium monies.
- **16.** Each exhibitor is required to keep their animals and pens/stalls in a clean, presentable condition from arrival on Tuesday through the close of the fair on Saturday evening or risk losing premium points.
- 17. A special area has been set aside for trimming tables. Clipping chutes may be left between the barns during the fair; however, they must be arranged perpendicular to the beef barn. Hair clippings must be kept cleaned up.
- **18.** Steers must be dehorned (healed and regrowth not to exceed 2 inches) or naturally polled. Horned heifers may be shown in Fitting and Showing Classes only if their horns are weighted.
- No boars, bulls, rams or stallions shall be used in any Fitting and Showing Classes. No bull over eight months of age out of stall without nose tags.
- 20. All Market and Fit & Show lambs are to be shorn 45 days prior to the fair arrival date, or slick shorn within seven days of fair arrival date.
- 21. Youth and FFA exhibitors with market animals be sure to read Market Sale Rules and Regulations.

- 22. An exhibitor may have two entries per class unless stated differently in individual department rules of the stock.
- 23. Youth, FFA and Open Youth may enter unregistered breeding stock.
- 24. The Superintendent's Handbook addresses the livestock grievance procedure. Contact superintendent for proper steps to be taken. Complaints to be reviewed by the ethics committee can be started by paying a \$100 deposit and submitting the complaint in writing with a signature to the department superintendent.

Include your name, address, phone number and indicate if you are staying on the fairgrounds during the week. If a ruling is made in favor of the complainant, the \$100 will be refunded. If the ruling goes against the complainant, there will not be a refund.

- 25. If the exhibitor chooses to bring multiple animals within one species, they must designate a division (*Youth or FFA*) for the species. Exhibitors may show only show in one division (Youth or FFA) within a species.
- 26. Youth and Grange horse exhibitors may not show open with their Youth and FFA animals. Youth and FFA exhibits MAY show open provided that a second animal is shown under open rules.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Individual health certificates on Washington animals are not required for entry into the fair.
- 2. NO ANIMAL from any quarantined area or premises will be permitted to enter the fair.
- 3. ALL OUT OF STATE animals must comply with the state of Washington import regulations and have a health certificate or receive an exemption each year from the state veterinarian for exhibition at the fair only.
- 4. OUT OF STATE animals must follow the following minimum requirements for animals entered the Othello Fair:
 - a. **Beef** may be entered without a test for brucellosis from the free states of Idaho and Oregon.
 - b. **Dairy goats** over six months old shall be blood tested for brucellosis and found negative within 30 days of entry to the fair.
 - c. **Dairy cattle** identified as official calfhood vaccinates under 20 months of age and beef cattle identified as official calfhood vaccinates under 24 months of age should not be tested.
 - d. **Poultry** shall originate from a US, Pullorum Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks or have a negative Pullorum Typhoid test within 90 days of entry to the fair.

- e. **Sheep** must originate from a flock in which no scrappie has existed for three years.
- f. All breeding rams six months of age and over must have a negative ELISA test for brucella ovis within 30 days or be from a brucella free flock. Each ram must be individually identified with an ear tag or registered tattoo.
- g. Steers will be exempt from Brucellosis.
- h. **Horses:** It is strongly recommended that all horses have a 5-way vaccination.

Veterinarians will be on the grounds and will reject any animal with infections, contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious eczema, scabies, lice, mites, ticks and fleas all fall into these categories. Such rejections or recommendations will be at the expense of the exhibitor. Fair Veterinarian decision as to the health status of an animal is final and shall be upheld by the Fair Board.

The veterinarian contact is the Livestock Committee President. All non-emergency calls to the vet should be through the livestock office. If the veterinarian is called for your animal, you are responsible for ALL veterinarian fees.


Youth and FFA MARKET STOCK SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS: 3e 12

- The sale is open to Youth Junior, Youth Intermediate, Youth Senior and FFA members residing in Adams, Grant, Lincoln, Franklin, and Whitman Counties. Qualified, regularly enrolled 4-H and FFA members will be allowed to compete their projects for up to one full year following high school graduation.
- 2. Proof of ownership of beef entries must be available to the superintendent and Livestock Sales Committee. If animal is an "owner bred" animal, a statement certifying such signed by the student, Ag teacher, or 4H instructor AND parents will be accepted as proof of ownership.
- 3. There will be random checks for *"proof of ownership"* of market animals.
- 4. Each exhibitor may sell a single market animal in the department of their choice. If the exhibitor is showing two market animals, regardless of species, the highest placing market animal is the animal which sells.
- Animals observed without food and/or water for extended periods of time will result in exhibitors forfeiting all premium points and will be pulled from sale line up upon investigation by the ethics committee.

- 6. Animals must meet minimum grade standard as follows:
 - a. Market Hogs U.S. No. 1 & U.S. No. 2 and weigh 230-300 lbs. (ZERO TOLERANCE)
 - b. Market Lambs Prime, Choice or Good and weigh 110-165 lbs.
 - c. Market Steers Prime, Choice or Select and weigh 1150-1550 lbs.
 - d. Market Goats-60-100# Payout up to 100#, over no grand or reserve awarded.
- 7. Any animal not within the weight guidelines will not be allowed to be sold through the livestock sale.
- 8. A minimum of three participants in each division (i.e., Youth and FFA) will be required before a Grand Championship buckle is awarded, unless determined by a judge.
- 9. All other places in Market will receive a ribbon or plaque.
- **10.** Each exhibitor must show their own animal. An exhibitor must report to the superintendent to be excused in writing if they cannot show.
- 11. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Market animals must be sold at the Market Sale, except when both Grand and Reserve animals are owned by one exhibitor, then only Grand Champion will sell in the Market Sale.
- **12.** Also, the desired destination of the second animal needs to be finalized on Thursday.

- 13. If an animal has previously gone through another fair market sale, it may not be shown or sold at this fair during the same calendar year (January 1st-December 31st).
- 14. White ribbon animals will be sold through the market sale.
- **15.** Market Sale time will begin at 11:00am Saturday morning.
- **16.** Any exhibitor not in sale line up on time will be omitted from the sale, unless excused by the barn superintendent.
- **17.** Any carcass found to contain drugs or tranquilizers by the federal inspector at the slaughter plant will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Sale monies will be withheld from the exhibitor and returned to the buyer.
- **18.** All animals will be floored by the packer.
- **19.** Terms of the Market Sale are cash. Buyers must pay the sale secretary or arrange for payment before leaving the grounds **UNLESS** already agreed to be invoiced with the sales office.
- **20.** There will be a 4% commission deducted from seller check at the time of payment.
- 21. Immediately after the animal is sold, the seller must obtain the sign showing buyer and seller from the Sale Committee and display it neatly above the animal's stall for the remainder of the fair. The seller is responsible for the feeding and care of the market sale animals until the official close of the fair Saturday evening.
- 22. The seller is responsible for the care and feeding of sale animal until the official end of the fair.

- 23. Exhibitors must be present when their livestock is weighed in unless prior arrangements with the superintendent.
- 24. The Livestock Sale starts Sat. morning of the fair. Time and sale order will be announced during the livestock meeting Wed. morning of Fair.
- 25. Pictures of exhibitors and their animals will be taken immediately after they have been awarded and used for buyer appreciation cards for the buyers.
- 26. Exhibitors are responsible for the clean-up of their animals, cages, decorations, personal belongings, garbage following the conclusion of the fair on Sunday morning.
- 27. Early removal or things not cleaned will result in forfeiting of premiums. Have the superintendent inspect the area before noon.
- 28. No bulls, boars, rams or cryptorchids are allowed in the Meat Market Classes or at the Market Sale.



DAIRY HEIFER SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Springer heifers must be within 60 days of calving. Bred heifers are those more than 60 days, but less than 120 days from calving.
- 2. Dairy heifers must be weighed off the truck. Weights must be approximately 1,000 lbs. or more for springer heifers and 850 lbs. or more for bred heifers (heavy breed).
- 3. Limit of one animal sold per exhibitor or one market animal per livestock sale (see rule #4: Market Sale Rules and Regulations).

- 4. Member must bring pedigree and production information with entry on the first day of fair.
- 5. All animals must meet state health requirements.
- 6. All sale heifers will be pregnancy checked at the fair by a DVM hired by the Livestock Sale Committee and the fee deducted from the sale proceeds.
- 7. Animals with horns are NOT ALLOWED.
- 8. Registration paper and signed transfer slip must be turned in when weighed at the fair.
- 9. Transfer fee to be paid by the seller.
- 10. Health and brand slip must be brought with animal

- 11. All heifers shown in the Dairy Sale Class must be sold through the sale, except for sickness verified by a certified veterinarian. Any exhibitor pulling an animal for any other reason after showing will be barred from future sales and premium monies will be forfeited.
- 12. A good durable halter must be left on the sale heifers until penned for load out.
- 13. If a heifer calves at the fair, the calf sells and goes with the cow.

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The National FFA organization believes that livestock exhibition and judging competitions off significant opportunities for the personal, social, and career growth of its members. Participation in competitive events requires the highest personal standards of ethics, integrity and fair play as called for in the FFA Code of Ethics. FFA members are expected to comply with the specific rules of each competition and to adhere to the National Show Ring Code of Ethics. Additionally, FFA does not condone or tolerate abuse or mistreatment of animals in any form in its activities, programs, or competitions. The organization actively supports the training and education of FFA members and advisors in the proper ethical behavior for livestock competitions an in the application of sound humane principles of animal husbandry.



4-H POLICY ON LIVESTOCK COMPETITIONS

The use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development Program. Extension personnel, 4-H volunteers, families, youth, and fair/show officials have the legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances and report those who do use any illegal substance. The administration of any drug or medication that could affect an animal's disposition or performance, resulting in an unfair advantage, is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply.





FFA RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Othello Fair is **NOT** a state fair qualifying event.
- 2. All horses will be brought to the fair through the livestock gate. Trailers will park in the field near warm up arena.
- **3.** All horses must be inside or tied at their trailer until the vet check is completed.
 - a. The vet will be at the fairgrounds between 3:00pm and 6:00pm on check-in day.
 - b. It is encouraged that all horses be up to date on all vaccines, specifically a 5-way vaccine.
 - c. You may set up your stall while waiting for the vet to complete the vet check.
 - d. Any horse that does not pass the vet check will be asked to be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.
- **4.** A signed release of liability and signed National Show Ethics must be presented to the superintendent at vet check.
- 5. This is a non-sanctioned, non-affiliated horse show. Any issues regarding conduct, safety, health, and well-being of a horse will be directed to the horse superintendent.
- 6. All guidelines for how disputes will be handled are posted at the Horse Office. Once a ruling is made by the superintendent, Livestock Committee, judge and/or Othello Fair Association it is FINAL and will be upheld by all involved.
- 7. All FFA exhibitors will follow the rules outlined in this section.
- 8. All horses shall remain in their stalls except when being shown, exercised, or groomed. All horses remaining on the grounds overnight must be stalled. No exhibitor will remove a horse from the fairgrounds without approval from the General Superintendent. Exception for horses hauling in for the open show ONLY.
 - a. If a horse must leave the grounds during the fair a letter from an accredited veterinarian will be required and presented to the Horse Superintendent. Excuse to leave will be documented by a statement and signature on the stall card.
 - b. Any exhibitor removing a horse without approval WILL forfeit all premium monies earned that year and will be prohibited from competing the following year.
 - c. All horses must exit the fair Sunday morning after their stall is stripped and inspected.

FFA HORSE RULES AND REGULATIONS (cont.)

- 9. Stalls **MUST** be cleaned daily, prior to the fair gates opening to the public (8:00am), as well as prior to them closing to the public at the end of each day (10:00pm Wed/Thurs, 11:00pm Fri, 12:00am Sat).
- **10.** Horses **MUST** always have water and be fed regularly. **NO** abuse or neglect of horses will be tolerated. This will be grounds for disqualification and removal from the fair with forfeiture of premium monies and the exhibitor will be prohibited from competing the following year.
- **11.** All horse exhibitors are **REQUIRED** to wear riding style boots whenever handling a horse.
- 12. All Youth horse exhibitors/riders (*including leaders*) or an open exhibitor under the age of 18 must wear an ASTM approved helmet when mounted.
- **13.** No riding a rose using a halter as a bridle.
- 14. No riding in the barns. NO riding doubles. Riders MUST always have one hand on the reins!
- 15. Any sick or injured animal must be reported to the horse superintendent IMMEDIATELY!



RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Show management reserves the right to combine any class which has fewer than three entries.
- 2. Each age group will be judged separately, even if/when they work in the arena at the same time.
- 3. NO one is allowed to coach a contestant while contestants are in the ring.
- 4. Exhibitors may only show their own horse(s) which they have current Horse Certificates on file with the horse superintendent. (Exception is Groom Squad).
- 5. Exhibitors must participate in showmanship and show any/all horses entered in other classes at the fair or lose their premium monies. An exhibitor must report to the superintendent to be excused in writing if they cannot show.
- 6. If the exhibitor is showing separate horses in performance and western games EACH horse must be exhibited in showmanship in their respective section.
- 7. The top Youth and FFA winners from the showmanship class must compete in Round Robin or notify the superintendent immediately after the time of winning that they cannot show.
- 8. The show arena and in-gate are off limits to spectators except working show personnel.
- 9. All class(es) must be registered through the ShoWorks website by September 1st. No additions will be allowed after that date.
- 10. If an exhibitor needs to be scratched from a class, notification to show management **MUST** be given no later than 30 minutes before the class starts.
- **11.** The judge's decision is final, no exceptions.

- g. Open Show horses needing stalled for the day and horses used in the Rodeo Queen competition must contact the superintendent for stalling information.
- h. All horses are allowed to exit the fair after their stall is stripped and inspected.
- i. Failure to strip the stall clean prior to leaving will result in a **\$20 fine**. If the fine is not paid it will be applied to the following year's entry.
- 3. Open Western Games will run concurrently with 4-H/FFA Western Games (see 4-H/FFA section for games list and information).

- 4. Open Trail will run concurrently with 4-H/FFA Trail. Open Trail will include:
 - a. Lead Line

- 5. This is a non-sanctioned/nonaffiliated horse show. Any issue regarding conduct, safety, health, and well-being of a horse will be directed to the superintendent.





- All Swine will be required to have a USDA #840 number in their ear on animal along with Othello Fair tags. Hogs MUST be tagged on arrival (before entry into fair).
- 2. NO ONE is allowed at weigh-in table except superintendent. Hogs must have owners name with weigh-in slip and have Animal Health Record Forms filled out.
- 3. Animals observed without food and/or water for extended periods of time, exhibitor will forfeit all premium points and be pulled from sale line up upon investigation by the ethics committee.
- 4. Exhibitors must keep animal and stall well-groomed until close of fair or forfeit ALL premiums.
- 5. ALL Swine to be registered on arrival at fairgrounds with superintendent and will not be removed until check out by superintendent on Sunday.
- 6. Form for second market hog will be given to exhibitor at weigh-in. Forms must be turned in by 8:00am on Thursday. (Inbox location in Livestock Office). If not turned in, the superintendent will decide what will be done with the animal, i.e. take home, sold at floor.
- 7. For SAFETY we will not allow electric shears or extension cords in the Swine Barn.
- 8. Pigs may be clipped, but no closer than ½ inch.
- **9.** No one is allowed in the barn before 8:00am on Sunday.



- **10.** All ear tags must be removed prior to weigh-in, unless there is a Federal ID tag. Ear tags will be provided.




